PRESIDENT'S (SEVENTH) REPORT

A club member attending a recent meeting of the Board of Directors commented, "My goshi I thought this was a hiking club, not some sort of political movement!"

Those of us who shared in founding the club often are equally consternated. Though from the beginning we had a political agends, we naively supposed we could get at it mainly with our feet. Wistfully we recall the Day of Three Lightning Storms -- and wonder if Somebody, that day, wasn't trying to tell us something...

Well, let's make one thing perfectly clear: Political activity is not required of IATC members. Or rather, walking trails of the Alps is in itself a political statement of the greatest importance, and so is riding bicycles and horses.

However, at least-some of us are going to have to do something more. In months ahead you will be reading about your trail system in the press, hearing about it on radio and television, and thus will know when it's time to attend meetings, telephone public officials, write letters. But also you'll be getting action alerts from the IATC Telephone Tree.

Following are some of the issues that will require your action soon:

Newcastle Community Plan -- Cougar Mountain Regional Park

Public meetings will be held. The plan will move toward the County Council. Letters. Phone calls. Attendance.

The Central Newcastle Property Owners Association (actually representing only a half-dozen high-rolling land-developers who can afford to pay \$150,000 a year for a flak) will (1) try to get county approval for their plan to put 50,000 people -- a second Bellevue -- atop Cougar Mountain; (2) try to throw out the whole, long, county review process by incorporating a new City of Newcastle they expect to be able to manipulate; (3) try to hornswoggle the government, press and populace into believing their "Villages in the Park" scheme is just another name for the LATC Cougar Mountain Regional Park. They are, at present, permanently established in corridors of the King County Courthouse, giving all who will listen to them a deliberately false description of our proposal, and of theirs. We urge you to read the comparison of the two proposals in the new Guide to Trails of Cougar Mountain and Squak Mountain.


The high-rollers are not proposing villages and they are not proposing a park. What they are proposing is to profiteer at the public expense, to ravage Cougar Mountain, and then move on.

Tiger Mountain

The Trails Club, the City of Issaquah, and the Washington Environmental Council have formally requested the Department of Natural Resources to declare a moratorium on timber sales on Tiger pending preparation of a plan that recognizes it as an urban tree farm, a whole new coacept of forest management. Specifically, we want cancellation of the "New Stinger" Timber Sale that would devastate Many Creek Valley and the West Tiger Railroad Grade.

Meanwhile, we are making some progress in obtaining law enforcement on Tiger - in curbing the unrestrained frolics of the ATVs.



Plaintiff Trees

The Washington Environmental Council (of which IATC is a member club), Seattle Audubon Society (which co-sponsors Alge hikes with us regularly), and others are proceeding with a suit against the State of Bashington, seeking justice in the courts for 2,100,000 acres of trees managed by the DNR. The forest industry has intervened in the suit and pledged as such soney as is necessary to ensure continuation of preferred status on state lands. Our soney will be needed to stay in court.


In our area alone, the developers are plotting to build a Bellevue atop Cougar Mountain, two or three Bellevues on the East Sammaish Plateau, and several new Issaquaha -- on Tradition Plateau, Pickering Farm, wherever. They have formed Property Cunere of Washington (POW) to bust the public planning process altogether. FOW was formed to fight them in Newcastle, fight them on the East Sammanish Plateau, fight them in the councils and legislatures.

One of the strategies the developers are attempting is a "change of venue" -- taking Cougar Mountain out of the King County planning procedures where it has been for more than two years and where it is making good progress, and throwing it into a new City of Newcastle. OPTIONS opposes the creation of a new city -- actually, a non-city. The Trails Club has formally endorsed OPTIONS and urges its support.

In Alpiner we try to keep you up to date on major issues, but only at Board meetings can we thoroughly discuss what the scoundrels are doing in our Alps and how we can frustrate their knavish tricks, confound their politics.



At our seminars in November, December, February and March, Fred Rounds - who has mined and logged in the Alps for half a century and more - answered questions from the audience and in the process sketched the history of logging in the Alps from earliest bullteam and horse-logging days through "lokie" logging, truck logging and cat logging to the present time, and of coal mining from earliest times, in Newcastle and Issaquah and environs, and of early transportation by railroad, horse and buggy, and steamboat. He was joined by Lucile McDonald, well-known regional historian and author of many books and articles, and Jean Bacon of the Newcastle Historical Society.

However, we only just got well started. Fred again will be the central figure on our seminar panel, joined by others who also know the past better than many of us know the present. We'll get into new subjects - early farms, social life in the dens of Tobacco Road - and delve more deeply into logging and mining and all.

The format is loose -- any subject is fair game, every member of the audience is a member of the seminar.



EASTSIDE BICYCLING ACTIVITIES TO NOTE AND JOIN

Transportation by Bicycle - Classes taught by Reed Waite who is a League of American Theeless certified Effective Cycling Instructor. Spring quarter courses are offered by Bellevus Community College (8 sessions, Tuesdays, March 31-May 19) and the Redmond Park ar Recreation Department (8 sessions, Mondays and Wednesdays, April 27-May 20.

Pasic cycling skills and techniques are practiced each week on the road, supplemented by classroom discussion and readings on traffic safety, road hazards, emergency repairs, group riding and exercise physiology. Graduates are awarded League of American Wheelman "Effective Cyclist" certificates and patches. Bring your bicycle ready to ride for the first class. 

Rike Classification

Class 1: Short trips on improved paths at a pace easy for a just-walker or a parent with a babe on back, and periact for studying birds and were beetles and all.

Easy morning or afternoon, typically 3-4 hours at a loitering pace, Class 2: perhaps going 5 miles on the flat, or less if some elevation is

A fairly full day, from morning to afternoon, typically 5-6 hours on Class 3: the go, but with plenty of stops. Small children often come along, sometimes on parental backs.

Steady-going day, typically 6-7 hours but not really grueling. ... A person should be sure Class 3 is no strain before trying these.

Meeting Place

Virtually all hikes assemble at the Issaquah Park & Ride lot, west of Issaquah at Goode's Corner, the junction of Highway 900 and Newport Way, about } mile south of I-90. We gather at the south end.

For some hikes we assemble in downtown Issaquah and occasionally someplace else. Take note of the stated meeting place for each hike.

Most hikes are coordinated with the Metro 210 schedule. That is, hikes generally leave the Park & Ride lot at 8:30 or 9:30 in the morning or 12:30 in the afternoon, in each case shortly after scheduled arrival of a 210 from points west Check your 210 schedule.

Sponsorship

Issaquah Parks and Recreation sponsored these hikes before there was a club and continues to co-soonsor them.

We receive publicity assistance from Bellevue, Mercer Island, Renton, Seattle, and King County Parks Departments.
